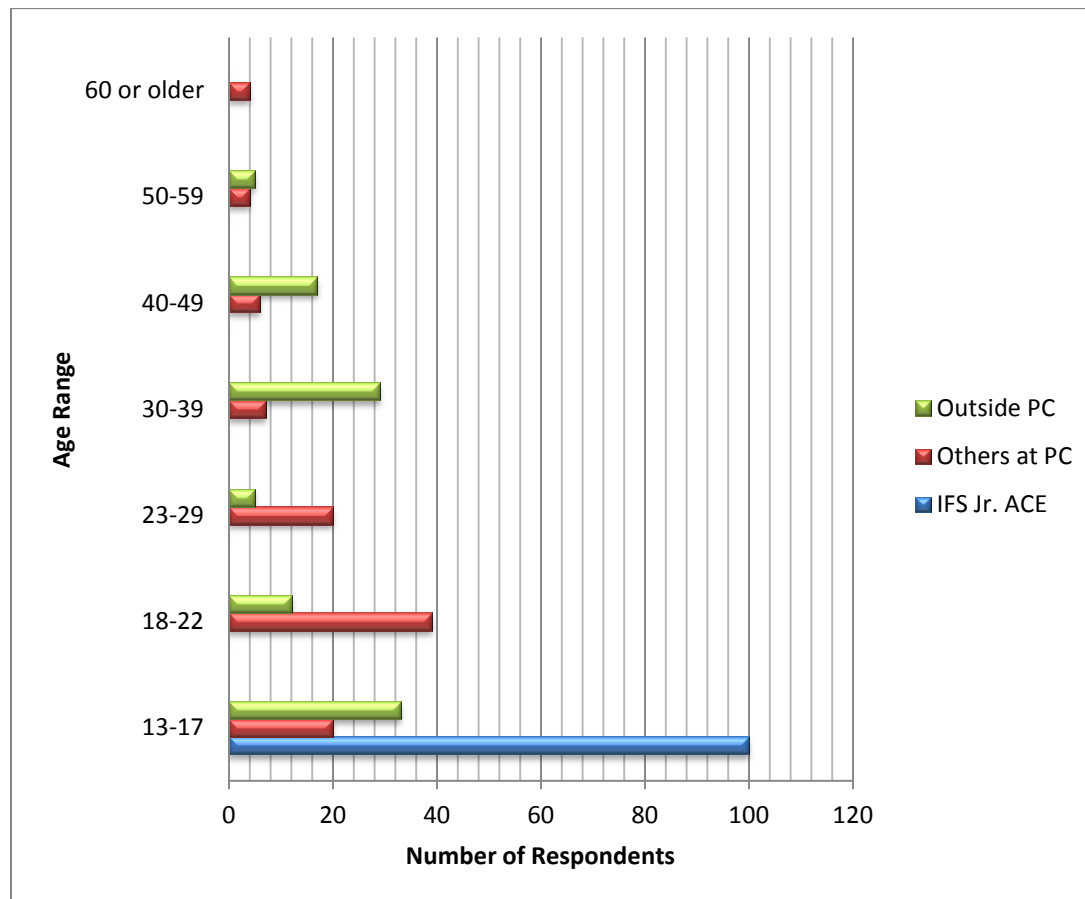

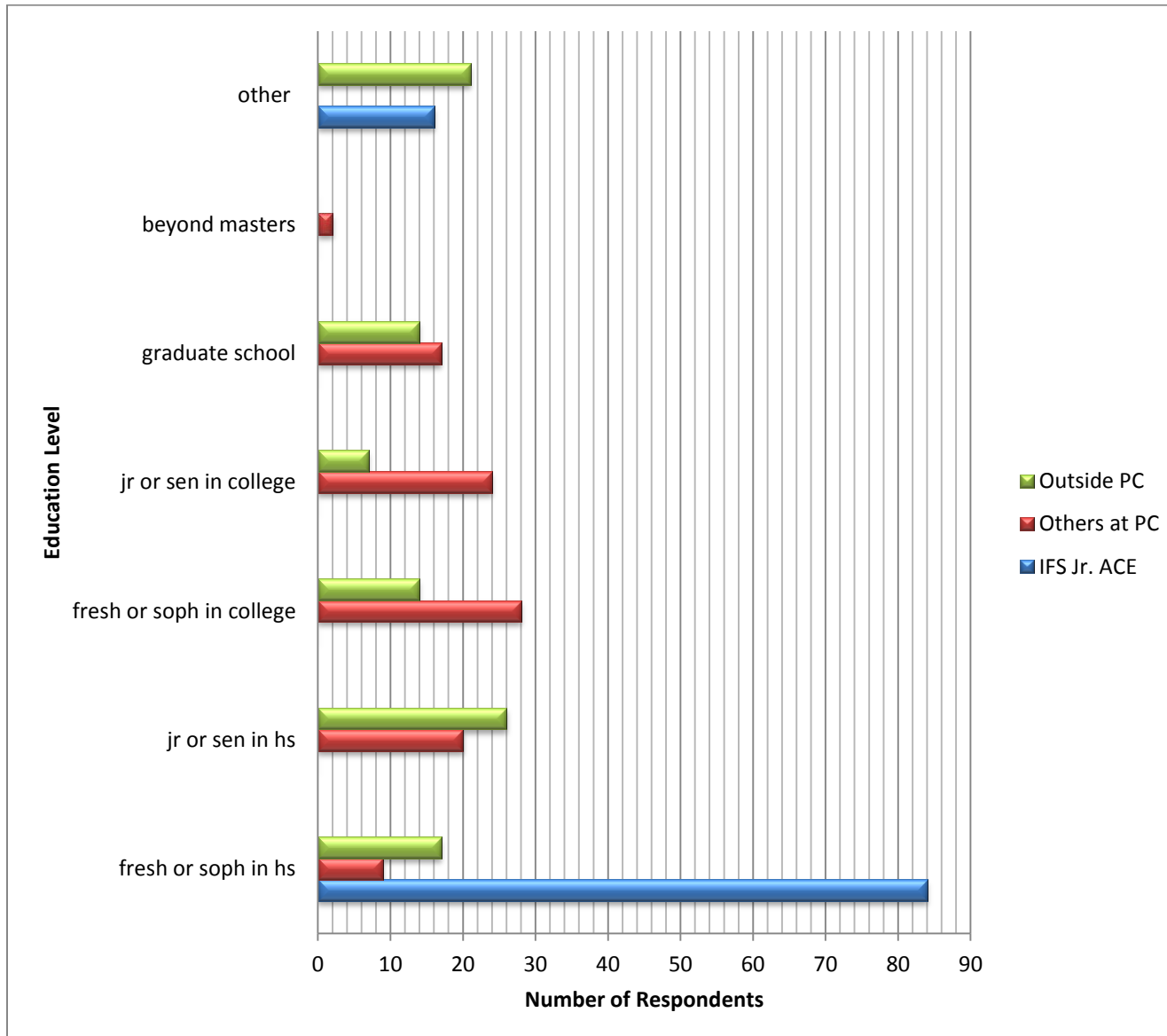

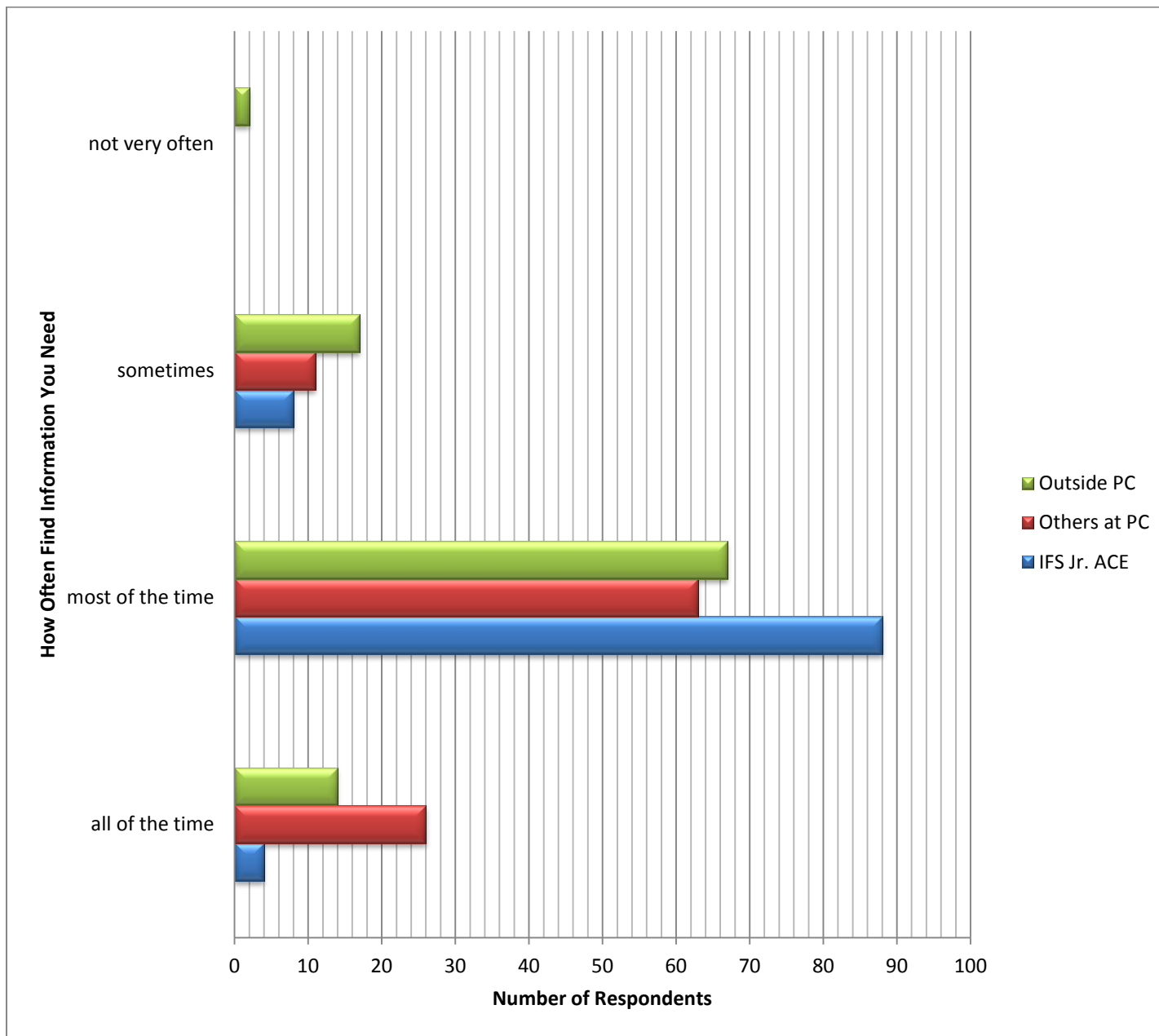
Question 1: What Best Describes Your Age Range? (percentage of those surveyed)



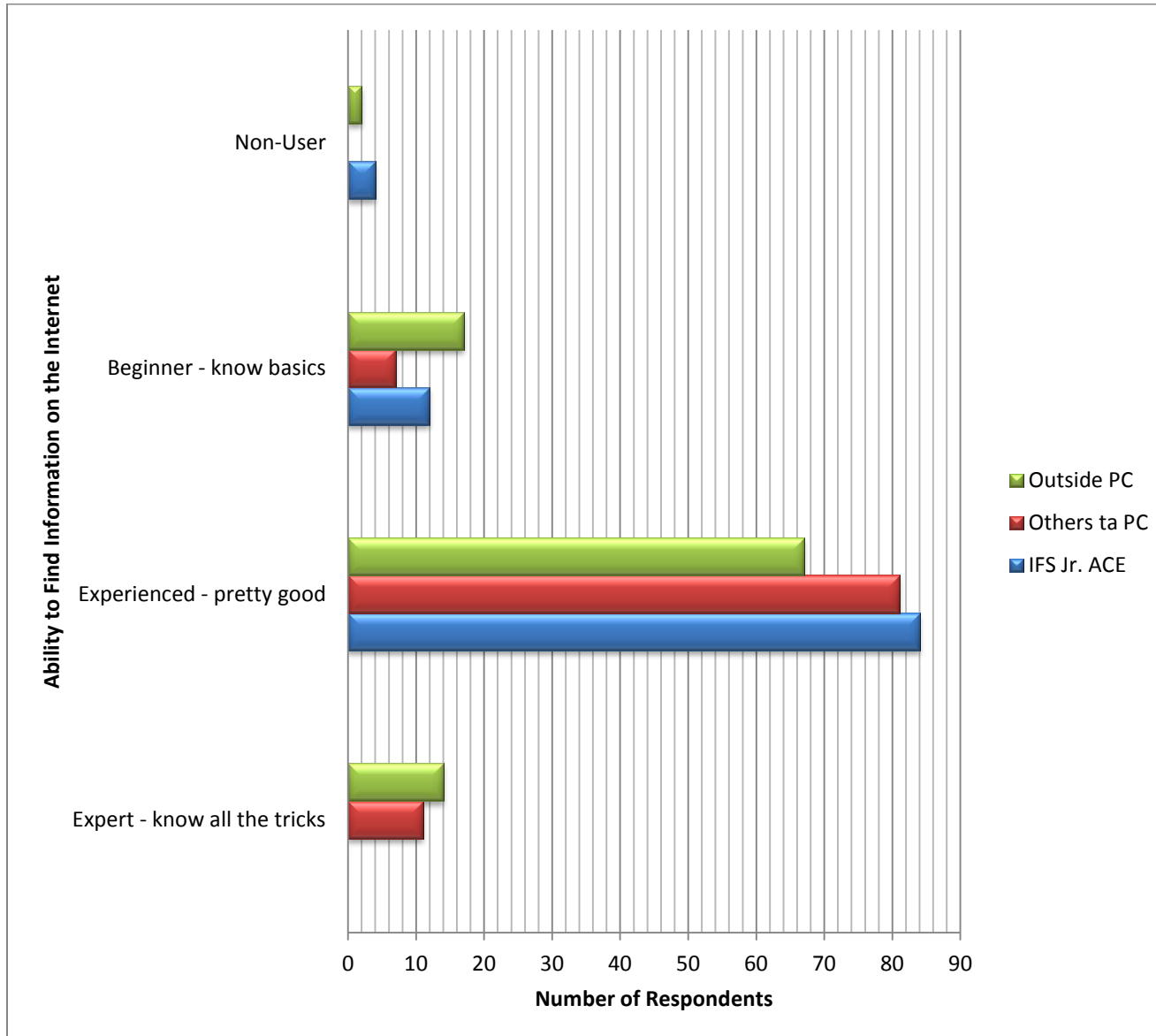
Question 2: What Best Describes Your Grade Level in School or Your Last Grade Completed? (percentage of those surveyed)



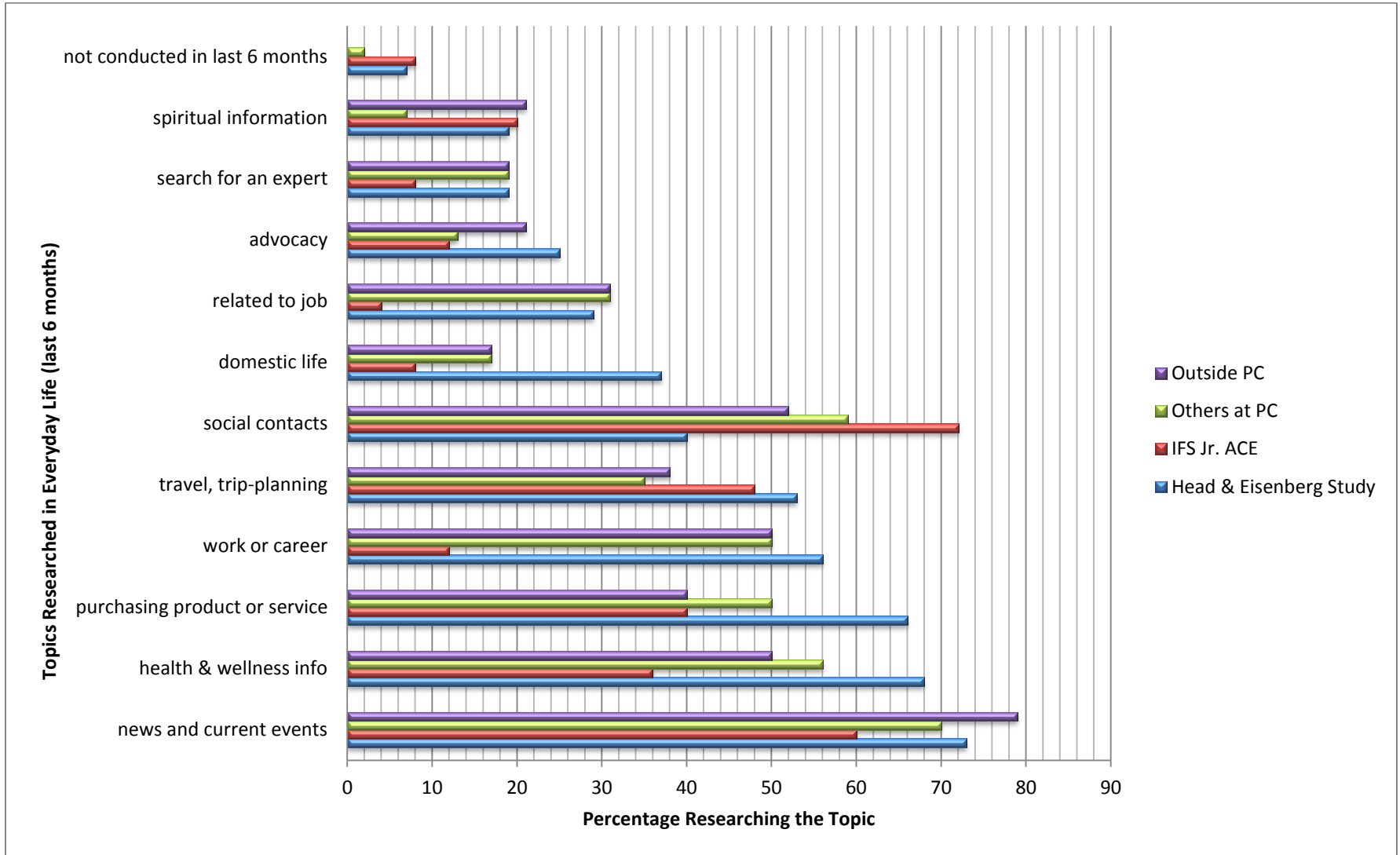
Question 3: When Conducting Research Using Any Available Source, How Often Do You Find the Information You Are Looking For? (% of those surveyed)



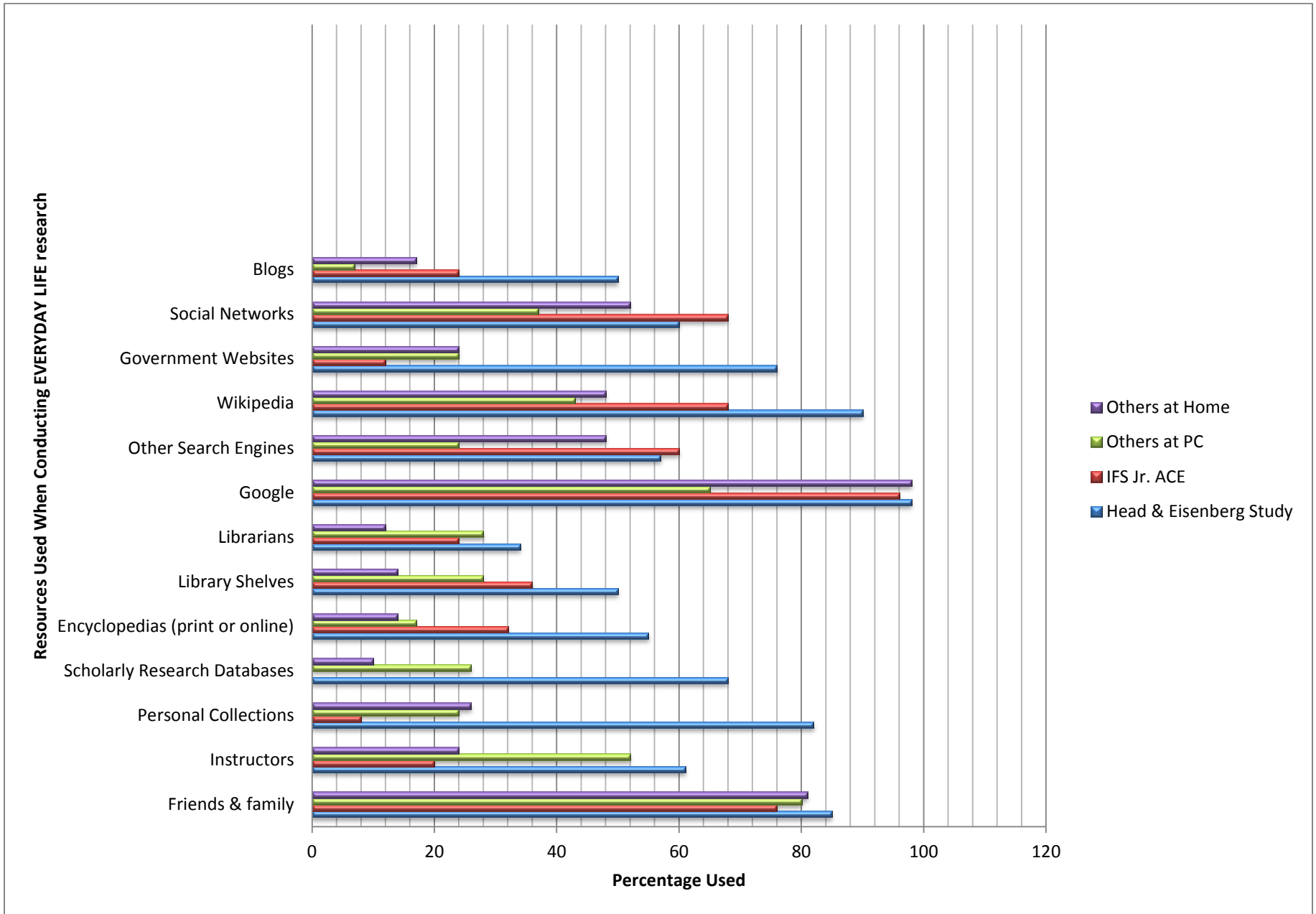
Question 4: How Would You Define Your Abilities to Locate Information on the Internet? (percentage of those surveyed)



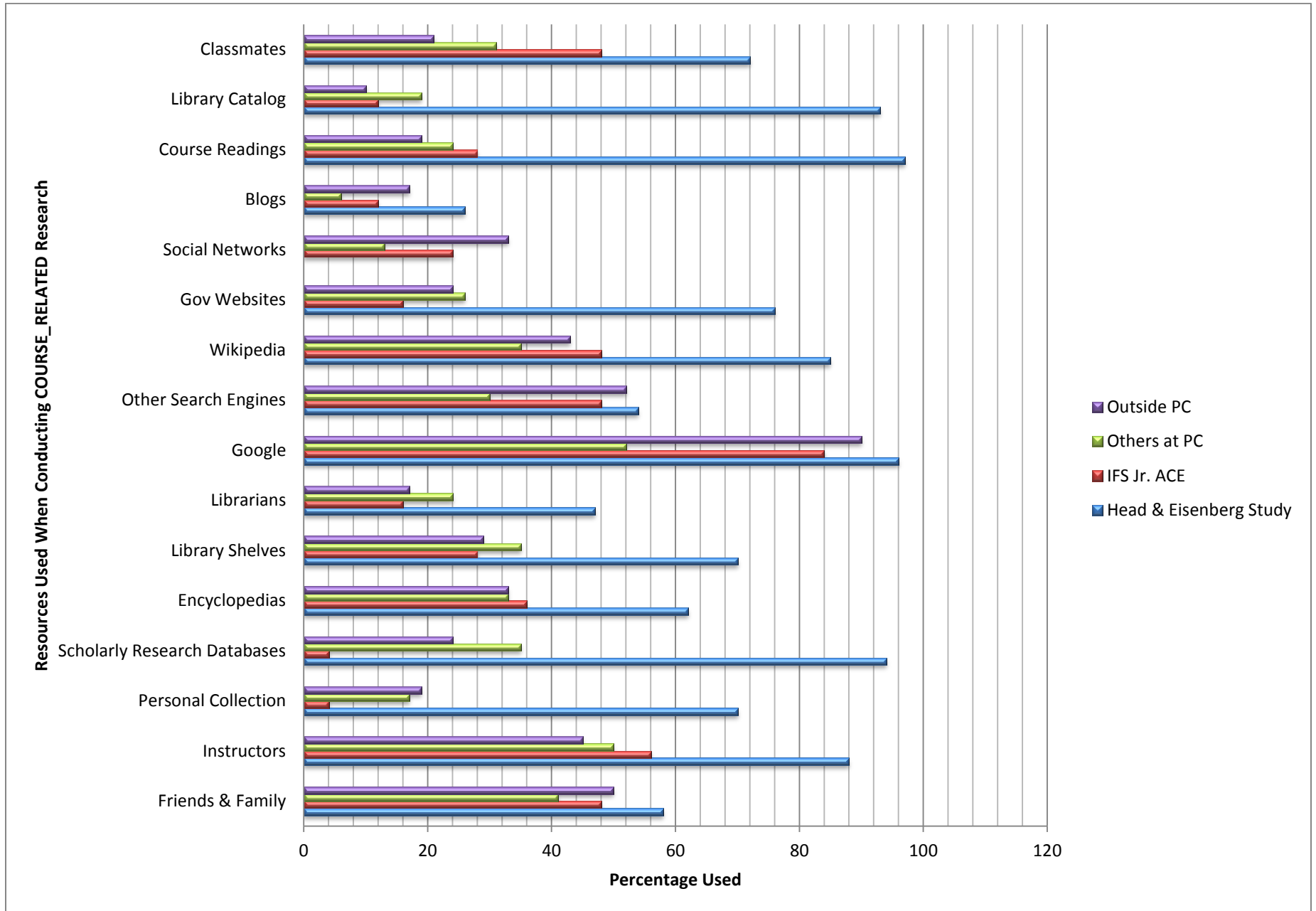
Question 5: Which of the Following Topics Have You Researched in the Last 6 Months for Personal Use in Everyday Life? (percentage of those surveyed)



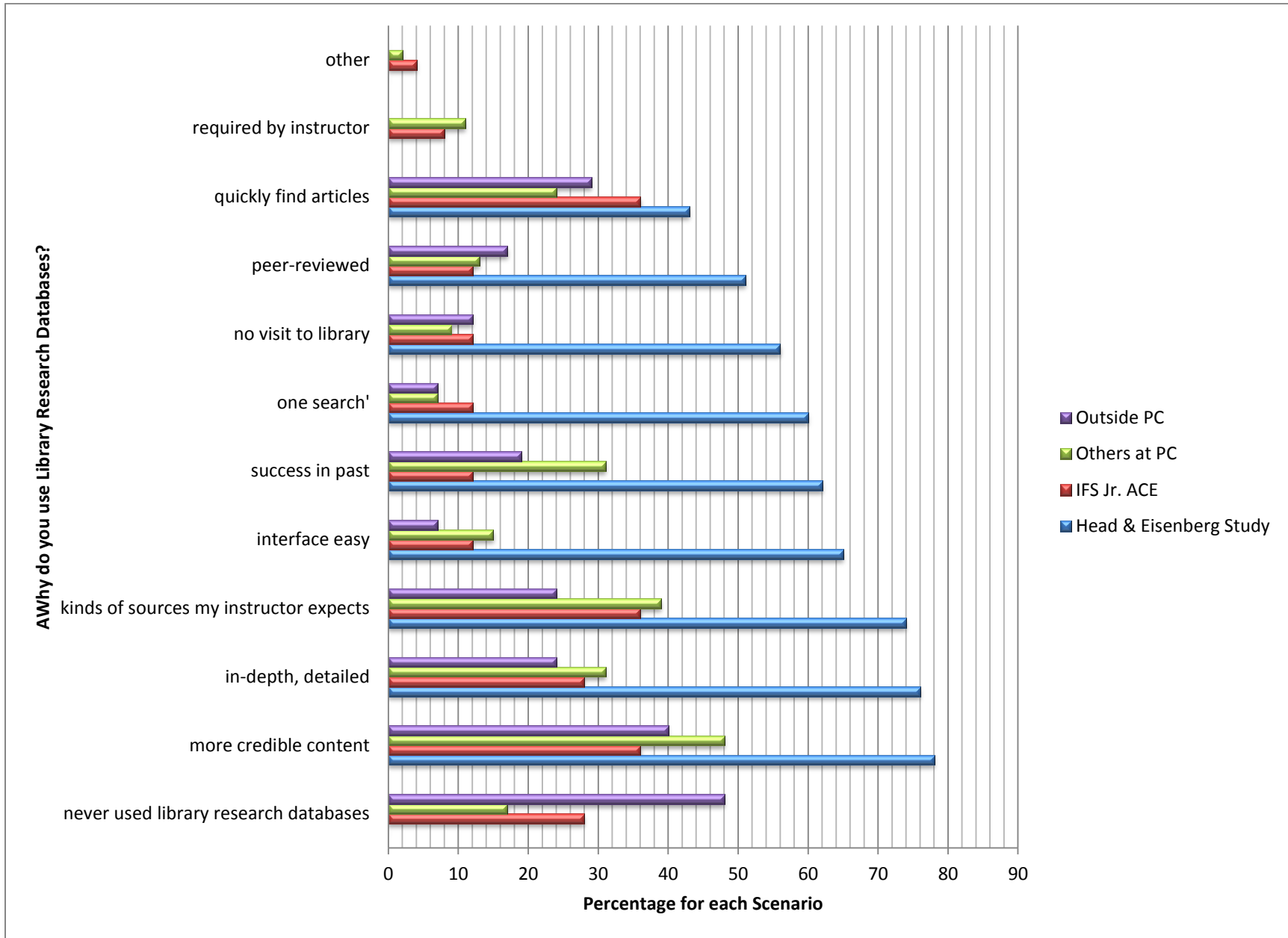
Question 6: Which of the Following Resources Have You Used When Conducting Everyday Life Research? (percentage of those surveyed)



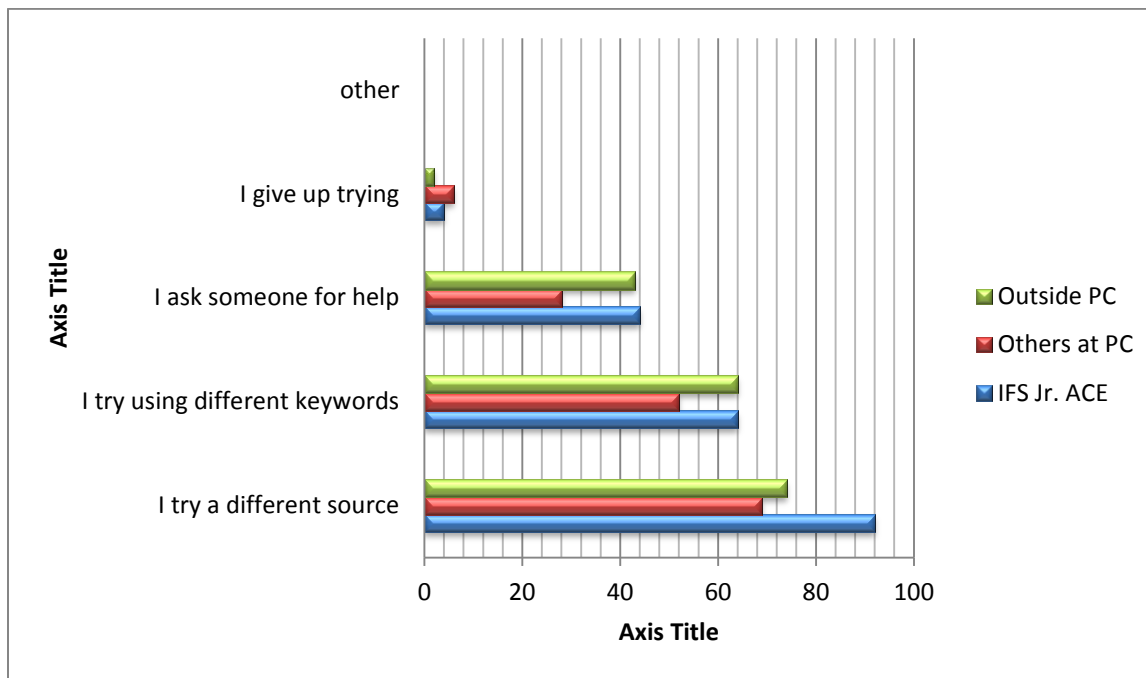
Question 7: Which of the Following Resources Have You Used When Conducting Course-Related Research? (percentage of those surveyed)
